RESOLUTION NO. 25-033

**AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE TO EXECUTE A SEWER AGREEMENT WITH
THE CITY OF NEWARK**

1 **WHEREAS**, the City of Newark ("City") owns, operates and maintains a sanitary sewerage
2 collection system within the City limits; and
3

4 **WHEREAS**, throughout the years, New Castle County ("County") and the City have
5 entered into agreements pertaining to the County's acceptance of wastewater from the City; and
6

7 **WHEREAS**, the current agreement between the County and the City dates to March 1,
8 1979 with amendments issuing later in 1979 and 2020 (collectively known as "1979 Agreement");
9 and
10

11 **WHEREAS**, the Parties agree that the 1979 Agreement should be replaced to reflect
12 current practices; and
13

14 **WHEREAS**, the County and the City recognize the need for close cooperation to minimize
15 the overall cost of service and improve efficiencies in serving County and City customers to the
16 greatest extent possible; and
17

18 **WHEREAS**, the County Executive has presented the Sewer Agreement listed below to
19 County Council for approval prior to the County Executive's signature; and
20

21 **WHEREAS**, County Council has determined that the purpose of the Sewer Agreement
22 listed below is to substantially advance, and is reasonably and rationally related to, legitimate
23 government interests (i.e., promoting the health, safety, morals, convenience, order, prosperity
24 and/or welfare of the present and future inhabitants of this State).
25

26 **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by and for the County Council of New Castle
27 County that County Council hereby authorizes the County Executive to sign the following
28 contract:
29

30 Sanitary Sewer Agreement between New Castle County and the City of Newark, as
31 attached. Pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, the City will be billed quarterly based on
32 metered sewage flow, Biochemical Oxygen Demand ("BOD") and Suspended Solids ("SS"). The
33 County will deduct from the City's quarterly invoice the County parcels that flow into the City's
34 sanitary sewer system. Likewise, the County will add to the City's quarterly invoice the parcels
35 from the City that flow into the County without passing through a meter. This Agreement provides
36 discharge flow limits for the City and requires the City to maintain programs to control hydrogen
37 sulfide and Fats, Oils and Greases ("FOG") within its sanitary sewer system. This is a ten-year
38 agreement during which time the Parties agree to meet quarterly to ensure good communication
39 and coordination on wastewater issues. The Parties agree to enter into the Multijurisdictional

40 Agreement attached as an exhibit to the Sewer Agreement to coordinate each Party's
41 responsibilities with respect to the City's Industrial Pretreatment Program.

SYNOPSIS: This Resolution allows the County Executive to sign the attached Sanitary Sewer Agreement with the City of Newark including the related Multijurisdictional Agreement on industrial pretreatment issues attached thereto.

FISCAL IMPACT: The attached Sanitary Sewer Agreement between New Castle County and the City of Newark requires the County to bill Newark on actual metered sewage flow in place of the current billing method, which is based on consumption. Metered flow is a more precise measure for billing purposes.

**SANITARY SEWER AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
NEW CASTLE COUNTY
AND
CITY OF NEWARK**

RECITALS

THIS AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) made this ____ day of _____, 2025, between NEW CASTLE COUNTY, a political subdivision of the State of Delaware (the “County”) and CITY OF NEWARK, a municipal corporation of the State of Delaware (the “City” or “Newark”) (each a “Party” and collectively known as the “Parties”).

WHEREAS, the City owns, operates and maintains a sanitary sewage collection and transmission system within the City limits (the “Newark System”); and

WHEREAS, the County owns, operates and maintains a major public sanitary sewage collection, transmission and treatment system within the unincorporated areas of the County (the “County System”) and for many decades has received wastewater from the Newark System and transmitted it for treatment to the City of Wilmington Wastewater Treatment Plant (the “Plant”); and

WHEREAS, throughout the years, the County and the City have entered into agreements pertaining to the County’s acceptance of wastewater from the Newark System; and

WHEREAS, the current written agreement between the County and the City dates to March 1, 1979 with amendments issuing later in 1979 and 2020 (collectively known as “1979 Agreement”); and

WHEREAS, simultaneous with the execution of this Agreement, the Parties will enter into a separate Multijurisdictional Agreement (“MJA”) to outline each Party’s responsibilities with respect to the City’s Industrial Pretreatment Program; and

WHEREAS, the County and the City recognize the need for close cooperation to minimize the overall cost of service and improve efficiencies in serving County and City customers to the greatest extent possible; and

WHEREAS, the Parties agree that the 1979 Agreement should be replaced to reflect current conditions; and

NOW THEREFORE, the City and the County, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants set forth in this Agreement, agree that the usage by the City of the County System shall be governed by and in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

ARTICLE I

STANDARDS AND REGULATIONS

1. The Recitals set forth above are incorporated into and made a part of this Agreement.
2. The County agrees to receive into the County System wastewater discharged from the Newark System at two locations known as “WCNN” (fka “Old Capital Trail”) and “WCNS” (fka “Brookside”) and to thereafter transmit this wastewater for treatment subject to the terms and conditions stated in this Agreement. The Parties acknowledge some minor exceptions to these two locations as described in greater detail in Article I, Paragraphs 5 and 6. The locations of WCNN and WCNS, as well as the minor exceptions to those two locations, are depicted in Exhibits A through J. These exhibits may be updated from time to time upon mutual written agreement by both Parties.
3. In no event shall the City discharge wastewater into the County System from any other locations, nor shall the City exceed the following discharge limits without the County’s prior written approval. Values are expressed in million gallons per day (“MGD”).

The instantaneous peak flow for WCNN shall be 4.500 MGD. The instantaneous peak flow for WCNS shall be 7.400 MGD.

In no event shall the City exceed the limits for either WCNN or WCNS as stated above without the County’s prior written approval to do so. If the City exceeds the values listed above, it shall investigate and determine the cause of the exceedance(s) within ten (10) business days of notification of the exceedance. If the County believes that further analysis is warranted, the County may require the City to complete a formal study of the Newark System. If the City refuses to complete a formal study, the County may do so at the City’s expense. Any improvements to the Newark System that the investigation and/or study recommends to prevent a future exceedance shall be undertaken and paid for by the City. Should the County need to undertake an improvement within the County System to mitigate against the risks posed by an exceedance from the City, the City agrees to pay for the improvement.

4. Should the City request an increase to the annual average flow limits above to accommodate anticipated land development, the County will review the request. If the County approves the request, it will then determine if a capital improvement is required to accommodate the City’s new capacity limit. The County’s Department of Public Works will request the appropriate funding in the capital improvement program. The capacity limit will not change until the completion of the capital improvement. There is no guarantee of a schedule for the completion of the capital improvement.

5. The Parties acknowledge that there are County sewer customers that flow into the Newark System from the County System before the flow is ultimately transmitted back into the County System at WCNS. The County shall notify the City in advance if it anticipates any such County customer's sewer flow to significantly increase at any point or if a new connection that would flow through the Newark System has been requested. The City reserves the right to prohibit the new connection or increased flow but agrees to continue to receive any existing flow into the Newark System.
6. The Parties acknowledge that there are City sewer customers that flow directly to the County System without passing through WCNN or WCNS. The City shall notify the County in advance if it anticipates that a new City sewer customer will flow to the County System such that its flows will not pass through either WCNN or WCNS or if any such existing City sewer customer's flow will significantly increase. The County reserves the right to prohibit the new connection or increased flow but agrees to continue to receive any existing flow.
7. As depicted in Exhibits A through J, the County shall, at its own cost and expense, maintain and operate the County System and the City shall, at its own cost and expense, maintain and operate the Newark System. The Parties agree to continue to coordinate maintenance and responses to emergencies as appropriate.
8. Should a property owner outside the corporate limits of the City make a request to the City that it be allowed to connect directly to the City's sanitary sewer system, the City shall first determine whether it wishes to allow the property to connect to its sanitary sewer system. Should the City wish to allow the connection, the City shall then obtain the approval of the County's Department of Public Works prior to granting the request. The County's Department of Public Works may approve or deny the City's request in its sole discretion. If the Department of Public Works approves the request, the City shall operate and maintain any public sewer infrastructure that it or a private contractor has constructed to provide sewer service to the property in accordance with the City's Water and Wastewater Standards and Specifications. As set forth in Article II, for any property outside of the corporate limits of the City directly connected to the City System, the City shall bill the property directly and charge an out of City rate for collection, transmission and treatment.
9. The City shall not receive sanitary sewage, industrial wastewater, or other matter into its sewer system from (A) any jurisdiction outside of the State of Delaware; or (B) outside of the Delaware River Basin unless permitted by the rules and regulations of the Delaware River Basin Commission. This provision is not intended to apply to sanitary sewer connections located in service areas within the City or County but outside of the Delaware River Basin.
10. The City previously adopted New Castle County Code, Chapter 38 pertaining to the regulation of non-domestic discharges to the sanitary sewer system. The City agrees to continue to ensure that the quality of the wastewater entering the County's System will meet the requirements of New Castle County Code, Chapter 38, the County's Pretreatment Regulations and any and all applicable municipal, state and federal laws and regulations for wastewater and will formulate and enforce necessary rules and regulations in order to do so. To that end, should the County have reason to believe that a sewer user within the

incorporated boundary of the City, other than a sewer user operating pursuant to a County-issued industrial wastewater discharge permit, is discharging a prohibited substance into the Newark System or the County System, the City agrees to investigate and take appropriate enforcement action.

11. Simultaneous with the execution of this Agreement, the City and the County will enter into the MJA, attached hereto as Exhibit K, delineating each Party's responsibilities with respect to the City's Industrial Pretreatment Program. The Parties agree to update the MJA from time to time as stated therein.
12. In addition to mitigating any wet-weather flows, the City shall maintain programs to control hydrogen sulfide and Fats, Oils and Grease ("FOG") within its sanitary sewer system. The County may monitor and analyze hydrogen sulfide and FOG levels from the City to determine the City's general maintenance of its system. The City agrees to conduct additional investigations of hydrogen sulfide and FOG based on the results of the County's investigations. In addition, should the County determine that additional measures need to be taken by the City to control hydrogen sulfide and/or FOG, the City agrees to work with the County to address the concerns, including implementing projects within the Newark System that reduce hydrogen sulfide and/or FOG to a level that does not impact the County System.
13. If wet-weather flows or a failure of the Newark System causes an overflow in the County System, the City will be responsible for any damages to private property or to the County System, including any fines levied against the County as a result of the overflow. The City agrees to reimburse the County for the costs it incurs in responding to the overflow. In accordance with Paragraph 3 above, if wet-weather flows persist, the City shall initiate appropriate studies and investigations to identify and correct the issue.
14. In the event that mandatory requirements imposed upon the County by statute or regulation enforceable by the State or a federal agency renders performance by the County impossible, the City agrees to accept, abide by and undertake its proportionate share of any additional expense or flow limitations or other applicable limitations. In the event of significant destruction or disablement of the County System, the County shall be relieved of its obligations under this agreement and may cancel the Agreement upon seven (7) days' notice.
15. Should any federal or state grant funding be or become available under which the County would be the intended recipient, the City agrees to cooperate with the County in the collection and compilation of any information needed to apply for said grants and, if required, to make the submittal applications. The City agrees to transfer any money received from said grants, less administrative expenses, to the County.
16. To ensure good communication and coordination on wastewater issues, the Parties shall meet on a quarterly basis to review, discuss and share information regarding the status of capacity, projects and studies, invoice adjustments described in Article II, flow and strength readings, system operations, Capital Recovery Fees paid, updates to their respective geographic information systems, land development planning and regulatory concerns.

17. The City shall accept responsibility for any and all damages, fines and costs to the County System and the Plant and/or its processes or to any third parties (including any contractors, consultants or employees at the Plant) that 1.) arise out of the City's breach of this Agreement or 2.) arise out of the City's negligence in proportion to the extent that such damages, fines and costs are caused by releases, spills or discharges of industrial waste or toxic pollutants discharged by Industrial Users in the City or from the discharge from any industry serviced by the City. This provision shall survive termination of this agreement.

ARTICLE II

BILLING AND PAYMENT

1. The County shall invoice the City as set forth herein and based on the contract user rate ("Rate") established each year by New Castle County Council including any charges and fees related thereto as may be set forth herein or in New Castle County Code.
2. The County shall invoice the City quarterly based on the sewage flow measured for the most recently available three-month period, Biochemical Oxygen Demand ("BOD") and Suspended Solids ("SS") entering the County System from the Newark System at the WCNN and WCNS locations. Payment to the County will be at a rate per 1,000 gallons of metered flow, at a rate per sampled pound of BOD, and at a rate per sampled pound of SS. The Rate for flow, BOD, and SS shall be as set by County Council each County fiscal year. In April of each year, the Ordinance containing the proposed sewer service charges for the following fiscal year is available from the County's website <https://www3.newcastlede.gov/legislation/search>.
3. In order to measure sewer flow, BOD, and SS, the County shall maintain sewage meters and samplers at WCNN and WCNS. The County shall maintain the flow meters and samplers in good order and repair. Meter calibration and repair records are available upon request. The flow meters shall be calibrated at least once each calendar year.
4. The quarterly invoice shall be determined by multiplying the measured sewage flow, BOD and SS by the respective sewer flow, BOD, and SS rates in effect for the applicable time period as described below. Adjustments to the quarterly invoice are also described below and shall be clearly depicted on each invoice. The data needed for the adjustments described in Paragraphs b, d and e below shall be provided annually by the applicable party no later than May 1 and applied to the next four quarterly invoices issued thereafter.
 - a. The County shall provide the City a split sample from WCNN and WCNS when sampling for billing purposes. Pounds of BOD and SS used for billing shall be the average pounds of the City's and County's testing results.
 - b. In recognition that wastewater enters the Newark System from the County System, the County agrees to deduct from the City's quarterly invoice the annual water consumption restated in gallons per day and multiplied by the number of days in the billing period and associated BOD and SS for each County parcel that flows into the

Newark System. The list of County parcels that flow into the Newark System is provided in Exhibit L. The County shall provide Newark the water consumption data.

- c. Actual sewage flow, BOD and SS recorded by the County from County Tax Parcel No. 1100400001, or any future subdivision of this tax parcel, which enters the Newark System, shall be deducted from the City's quarterly invoice. This parcel shall not be included in the deductions described in paragraph b above.
 - d. In recognition that some wastewater flow from the Newark System does not pass through a metered location set forth in Article I, Paragraph 2, but otherwise enters the County System, the City agrees that the County shall add the annual water consumption restated in gallons per day and multiplied by the number of days in the billing period and associated BOD and SS for each City parcel that does not pass through a metered location to the City's quarterly invoice. The list of City parcels that flow into the County System unmetered is provided in Exhibit M. The City shall provide the County water consumption data.
 - e. In recognition of the City managing their own stormwater flows, the County agrees to deduct from the City's quarterly invoice the percentage of County costs budgeted to the County's management of stormwater relative to the County's sewer budget as a whole at the time of a sewer rate increase. The initial percentage is 8.6%. Should the County's sewer rate change during the term of this Agreement, the County will update the percentage based on the year the rate is changed and provide the City with the new percentage.
 - f. Associated BOD and SS referenced in Paragraphs 4b and 4d above is the average BOD and SS at WCNN and WCNS used for billing for that particular billing quarter and is determined in accordance with paragraph 4(a).
5. For calendar quarters ending March 31st, June 30th, September 30th and December 31st, the County shall bill the City by emailing a quarterly invoice to the City's Department of Public Works and Water Resources with a copy to the City's Department of Finance by the first day of May, August, November and February. The City shall pay each quarterly invoice by the last day of May, August, November and February via ACH directly to the County's account according to the instructions provided by the County. The City shall provide the email addresses where the invoices should be sent. Any changes to the email addresses provided will be communicated by the City as needed.
 6. In the event the City fails to pay on the due date the sums due and owing to the County for any quarter during the term of this Agreement, the City shall pay to the County a penalty on such unpaid sums at the rate established in Section 38.02.503.G.3 of New Castle County Code, or if no such rate is established in New Castle County Code, at six (6) percent of the delinquent charge for the first month and one (1) percent of the unpaid principal balance as of the first day of every month thereafter.

7. If the City disputes any quarterly invoice received from the County, it shall notify the County in writing fifteen (15) days prior to the printed due date, as to the amount that is disputed and the basis of the dispute. To the extent the City disputes any quarterly invoice received from the County, the City shall, during the pendency of such dispute, pay the full amount due. Amounts determined to be overpayments after resolution of the dispute shall be credited toward future invoices and not refunded to the City.
8. The County shall continue to directly bill any parcel located within incorporated Newark that currently receives a sewer bill from the County, including but not limited to, Tax Parcel Nos. 1802100196, 1802100199, 1802100172, 1802100217, and 1802100218. Any future subdivision of these parcels would also continue to receive a sewer bill from the County unless this Agreement is revised.
9. The County shall establish, and provide the City with, the Capital Recovery Fee and any other sanitary sewer development fees or charges as determined by the County. At the time of contract execution, the Capital Recovery Fee to be paid by the City is \$2.90 per gallon of sewer flow per day. The Capital Recovery Fee is subject to change at a frequency to be determined by the County. The City will be notified of the change and the effective date of the change at least thirty (30) days in advance. Gallons of sewer flow per day shall be determined using the County's Design Flow Requirements, which is available on the County's website. The City shall charge the applicable fee or charges to any new connections to the Newark System. Within thirty (30) days of the close of each quarter, the City shall forward to the County all fees and charges collected that quarter via ACH directly to the County's account according to the instructions provided by the County.
10. As set forth in the MJA, the County shall charge industrial users within the City a permit fee that shall be set by the County.

ARTICLE III

ANNEXATION

1. Any proposed annexation shall be done in accordance with the procedures set forth in Law. Should the City annex any lands from the County, the City agrees to pay the County the cost of any existing sewer infrastructure, including any outstanding debt service, and to install, at its own cost and expense, any flowmeters, samplers or other equipment that the County deems necessary for the continuation of sewer service or for billing purposes. The specifications for said flowmeters and the installations thereof shall be approved by the County's Department of Public Works prior to installation. Any such meters or samplers installed will be maintained by the City in good order and repair and calibrated at least once each calendar year.

ARTICLE IV

GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. Effective Date

This Agreement shall become effective upon execution by the County and the City and shall remain in effect until June 30, 2035. The Parties shall begin negotiating the terms of a new Agreement by July 1, 2034. Unless the Parties agree to further extend the date, in the event the City and the County have not entered into a new agreement by January 31, 2035, they agree to engage in mediation. If mediation is not successful, they agree to proceed with binding arbitration in accordance with the provisions of Article IV, Paragraph 6. Unless provided otherwise for herein, the provisions of this Agreement shall survive termination until replaced by the terms of the next sewer agreement.

2. Entire Agreement and Modification

This Agreement and the MJA contain the full and complete understanding between the County and the City with respect to the subject matter set forth therein and supersedes any and all previous agreements, amendments, and proposals, whether oral or written. If there is any conflict between this Agreement and the MJA, this Agreement shall control. With the exception of modification in the manner set forth elsewhere in this Agreement, this Agreement may not be modified except by a written and duly executed amendatory agreement of the Parties hereto.

3. Headings

Any headings used herein are for convenience of reference only and shall not affect the construction of or be taken into consideration in interpreting this Agreement.

4. Assignment or Transfer of Agreement

Neither Party shall assign, subcontract, or otherwise transfer this Agreement or any portion thereof without the express written consent of the other Party.

5. Enforceability

If one or more of the provisions in this Agreement is held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect for any reason, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision of the Agreement, and the Agreement shall be construed as if the invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been included.

6. Arbitration

All claims, disputes and other matters in question between the Parties, arising out of or relating to this Agreement or the breach thereof, shall be decided by arbitration in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association ("AAA"), unless the Parties mutually agree otherwise. To be clear, the County's sewer rates are not a matter subject to arbitration. No arbitration, arising out of or relating to this Agreement shall include by consolidation, joinder or in any other manner, any

additional party not a party to this Agreement except by written consent containing a specified reference to this Agreement and signed by the Parties hereto. Any consent to arbitration involving an additional party or parties shall not constitute consent to arbitration of any dispute not described therein or with any party not named or described therein. This Agreement to arbitrate and any agreement to arbitrate with an additional party or parties duly consented to by the Parties hereto shall be specifically enforceable under the prevailing arbitration law. The demand for arbitration shall be filed in writing with the other party to this Agreement and with the AAA. The demand shall be made within a reasonable time after the claim, dispute or other matter in question has arisen. In no event shall the demand for arbitration be made after the date when the institution of legal or equitable proceedings based on such claim, dispute or other matter in question would be barred by the applicable statute of limitations or repose. The award rendered by the arbitrator shall be final, and judgment may be entered upon it in accordance with the applicable law in any court having jurisdiction thereof. The costs of arbitration shall be split equally, provided, however, that each party shall bear its own attorneys' fees and costs of preparing for and participating in any arbitration.

7. Cooperation and Information

The Parties agree to cooperate in all matters pertinent to this Agreement to the fullest extent possible and will work in good faith in carrying out its provisions. The City and the County agree to provide each other with reasonable information as requested.

8. Governing Law

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Delaware.

9. Notice

Any notice, demand, request, consent, approval or communication required by this Agreement shall be in writing, addressed to the other party at the addresses set forth below:

**MULTIJURISDICTIONAL AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
NEW CASTLE COUNTY AND THE CITY OF NEWARK
REGARDING NEWARK’S INDUSTRIAL PRETREATMENT PROGRAM**

THIS AGREEMENT (“Agreement”), made this ____ day of _____, 2025, by and between New Castle County (“County”), a political subdivision of the State of Delaware, and the City of Newark (“City”), a municipal corporation of the State of Delaware (each a “Party,” and collectively, “the Parties”).

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the County owns, operates and maintains a major sanitary sewer system (“County System”), and for many decades has received wastewater into the County System from the City and transmitted it to the Wilmington Wastewater Treatment Plant (“Plant”); and

WHEREAS, there are facilities located within the City that contribute wastewater containing industrial waste to the County System (“Industrial Users”); and

WHEREAS, the County’s transmission and treatment of City wastewater has been governed by a separate written agreement (hereinafter known as the “Sewer Agreement”) setting forth the terms, including the payment of fees, under which the County transmits and treats wastewater originating in the City. The last written Sewer Agreement is dated March 1, 1979. Simultaneous with the execution of this Agreement, the Parties will execute a new Sewer Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City previously adopted applicable parts of the County’s sewer use ordinance located in *New Castle County Code*, Chapter 38 and gave the County enforcement authority over its Industrial Users; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to enter into this Agreement to ensure that Industrial Users continue to be subject to necessary pretreatment controls such that the quality of wastewater entering the County System will meet the requirements of *New Castle County Code*, Chapter 38, and all applicable municipal, state and federal laws and regulations for wastewater and that the County continues to have enforcement authority over those Industrial Users; and

WHEREAS, in order to ensure that nondomestic dischargers continue to be properly regulated, with the County and City’s responsibilities for doing so clearly defined, and to ensure that the County continues to have the proper legal authority to implement the City’s industrial pretreatment program, it is necessary for the County to enter into a written agreement with the City; and

NOW, THEREFORE, intending to be legally bound hereby, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The Recitals set forth above are incorporated herein and made a part of this Agreement.
2. The City will adopt a local sewer use ordinance which is no less stringent and is as broad in scope as the County's sewer use ordinance found in *New Castle County Code*, Chapter 38, Article II, Division 38.02.700 and Article III ("Sewer Use Ordinance"). To the extent that the City's current sewer use ordinance is not as stringent or as broad in scope as that found in *New Castle County Code*, Chapter 38, including with respect to the provision of enforcement authority to the County, the City will forward to the County for review a draft of its proposed modifications as soon as practicable but no later than ninety (90) days from the Effective Date of this Agreement. The City will adopt its sewer use ordinance within sixty (60) days of receiving approval from the County of its content.
3. Whenever the County revises its Sewer Use Ordinance, it will forward a copy of the revisions to the City. The City will adopt revisions to its sewer use ordinance that are at least as stringent as those adopted by the County. The City will forward to the County for review its proposed revisions as soon as practicable but no later than ninety (90) days of receipt of the County's revisions. The City will adopt its revisions within sixty (60) days of receiving approval from the County of the content thereof.
4. The City will adopt pollutant specific local limits which address at least the same pollutant parameters and are at least as stringent as the local limits enacted by the County as soon as practicable but no later than ninety (90) days from the Effective Date of this Agreement. If the County makes any revisions or additions to its local limits, the County will forward to the City a copy of such revisions or additions within thirty (30) days of enactment thereof. The City will adopt any such revisions or additions as soon as practicable but no later than within ninety (90) days of receipt thereof.
5. The County shall continue to implement and enforce the City's sewer use ordinance against the City's Industrial Users. To that end, the County may take any action under the City's sewer use ordinance against Industrial Users that could have been taken by the City, including the enforcement of the ordinance in courts of law. The County will provide the City with a copy of its current Enforcement Response Plan. If the City believes that the County has not followed the County's Enforcement Response Plan about any specific incident, the City shall provide that information to the County and make a specific request for further County action under the County's Enforcement Response Plan.

6. The County will continue to perform technical and administrative duties necessary to implement and enforce the following parts of the City's sewer use ordinance. The County will: (1) issue permits to all Industrial Users required to obtain a permit and collect related permit fees as set by the County from those Industrial Users; (2) conduct inspections, sampling and analysis of Industrial Users that have been permitted by the County; (3) take all appropriate enforcement action as outlined in the County's Enforcement Response Plan and provided for in the City's sewer use ordinance; and (4) perform any other technical or administrative duties the County deems appropriate with regard to industrial permitting and enforcement. In addition, the County may, continue to take emergency action to stop or prevent any discharge which presents or may present an imminent danger to the health or welfare of humans, which reasonably appears to threaten the environment, or which threatens to cause interference, pass through, or sludge contamination. The City agrees to cooperate and assist the County in investigating accidental spills or discharges of toxic pollutants generated by Industrial Users.
7. The City shall update the County's Industrial Waste Survey when requested and notify the County of any new Industrial Users that require permits. Whenever a new Industrial User proposes operations in the City, or any time an existing permitted Industrial User changes its discharge in any way, the County will require that such Industrial User submit a new or updated permit application for review and approval.
8. The City shall accept responsibility for any and all damages, fines and costs to the County System and the Plant and/or its processes or to any third parties (including any contractors, consultants or employees at the Plant) that 1.) arise out of the City's breach of this Agreement or 2:) arise out of the City's negligence in proportion to the extent that such damages, fines and costs are caused by releases, spills or discharges of industrial waste or toxic pollutants discharged by Industrial Users in the City or from the discharge from any industry serviced by the City. This provision shall survive termination of this Agreement.
9. If any term of this Agreement is held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining terms will remain in full force and effect, and the Agreement shall be construed as if the invalid, illegal or unenforceable term had never been included.
10. The Parties will review and revise this Agreement to ensure compliance with the Federal Clean Water Act (42 U.S.C. §1251 *et seq.*) and the rules and regulations (see 40 C.F.R. Part 403) issued thereunder, as necessary, but at least every five (5) years on a date to be determined by the Parties.

11. The term of this Agreement shall be so long as any Industrial User is discharging to the County System unless earlier terminated by the County upon one hundred twenty (120) days written notice.
12. This Agreement contains the full and complete understanding between the Parties with regard to the City's industrial pretreatment program and supersedes any and all previous agreements or amendments, whether oral or written, that may exist on the subject matter. To be clear, this Agreement does not give the County oversight or enforcement of the City's Commercial Food Establishments or its program to prevents fats, oils and greases ("FOG") from entering the City's sanitary sewer system.
13. This Agreement may not be modified except by a written and duly executed amendatory agreement between the Parties.
14. The construction, interpretation and enforcement of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Delaware.
15. If the authority of the County to act as agent for the City under this Agreement is questioned by an Industrial User, court of law, or otherwise, the City will take whatever action is necessary to ensure the implementation and enforcement of its sewer use ordinance against its Industrial Users including, but not limited to, implementing and enforcing its sewer use ordinance on its own behalf and/or amending this Agreement to clarify the County's authority. The City agrees to reimburse the County its reasonable attorney fees and court costs incurred arising from court action with an Industrial User.
16. Any notice, demand, request, consent, approval or communication required by this Agreement shall be in writing, addressed to the other party at the addresses set forth below:

SYNOPSIS: This Ordinance, if approved, will appropriate federal funds of \$556,302.63 from the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) passed through the Delaware Emergency Management Agency (DEMA) to the Perimeter Firewalls Replacement (SLCGP) Grant, which will be administered by the Department of Administration, Office of Technology and Administrative Services.

It is the intent of the County Council that the provisions of this Ordinance shall be effective retroactive to January 8, 2025.

FISCAL NOTE: This Ordinance, if approved, will amend the Grants Budget by appropriating federal funds of \$556,302.63 from the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) passed through the Delaware Emergency Management Agency (DEMA) to the Perimeter Firewalls Replacement (SLCGP) Grant, which will be administered by the Department of Administration, Office of Technology and Administrative Services.

The Firewalls include a five-year license and no match is required. The estimated implementation cost of approximately \$10,000 will be absorbed in the Department's existing Approved Operating Budget and no additional budget will be required in FY2026 or FY2027.

This increase will affect FY2025 and FY2026, since the targeted program completion date for this grant is July 31, 2025.

1 **WHEREAS**, the County is in the process of conducting a general reassessment
2 of over 212,000 parcels of land pursuant to an Order issued by the Delaware Court of
3 Chancery in the case styled *In re: Delaware Public Schools Litigation*, 2018-0029-JTL
4 (Del. Ch.); and

5
6 **WHEREAS**, the general reassessment will value each parcel at its fair market
7 value as of July 1, 2024; and

8
9 **WHEREAS**, the list of the general reassessment assessed values will be finalized
10 and open for public inspection (and available for each parcel on Parcelview) by March
11 1, 2025; and

12
13 **WHEREAS**, the Delaware Code and the County Code provide parties aggrieved
14 by the new assessed value of their parcel a right of appeal; and

15
16 **WHEREAS**, it is anticipated that owners of 12,000-15,000 parcels will file appeals
17 of the general reassessment assessed value of their parcels caused by the Court
18 action; and

19
20 **WHEREAS**, both the Delaware Code and the County Code designate the Board
21 of Assessment Review ("BOAR") as the administrative body to hear and decide
22 appeals; and

23
24 **WHEREAS**, § 8311 of Title 9 of the Delaware Code provides that any person
25 desiring to take an appeal shall prior to March 15 file written notice thereof with the
26 BOAR on forms prescribed and made available by the BOAR; and

27
28 **WHEREAS**, § 1371C of Title 9 of the Delaware Code provides that County
29 Council may, by ordinance, authorize appointment of referees to hear appeals of
30 property assessments and authorizes the Chief Financial Officer to appoint, with the
31 advice and consent of County Council, the referees as are authorized by ordinance; and

33 **WHEREAS**, those referees appointed must be paid as provided by County
34 Council; and

36 **WHEREAS**, the BOAR has adopted rules and procedures that similarly allow for
37 the appointment of referees to hear appeals and provide the Board with a
38 recommendation of whether an assessment is correct or not; and

41 and issue a final decision on the appeal; and

48 residential reassessment appeals and \$50 per hour for hearing non-residential
49 reassessment appeals; and

51 **WHEREAS**, even with the use of referee hearings and recommendations, BOAR
52 members will be required to devote a significant amount of additional time beyond their
53 normal duties to decide the reassessment appeals; and

55 **WHEREAS**, § 1371A of Title 9 of the Delaware Code provides that each member
56 of the BOAR is entitled to remuneration as determined by County Council; and

58 **WHEREAS**, as a matter of fairness and to ensure that BOAR members are
59 willing to devote the substantial time necessary to decide reassessment appeals, the
60 BOAR members should be paid a special hourly rate of \$50 per hour that is different
61 than their normal pay rate for their consideration and hearing of reassessment appeals.

63 **NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNTY OF NEW CASTLE HEREBY ORDAINS:**

65 Section 1. The Chief Financial Officer may appoint, with the advice and
66 consent of County Council, referees to hear appeals and make recommendations to the
67 Board of Assessment Review of appeals filed by March 14, 2025 (for the July 1, 2025
68 through June 30, 2026 tax year) of the July 1, 2024 market value established by the
69 general reassessment. The referees shall possess such qualifications as the Chief
70 Financial Officer finds sufficient.

72 Section 2. The pay plans and rates of pay for members of the Board of
73 Assessment Review and referees are hereby amended only as to consideration of
74 appeals filed by March 14, 2025 (for the July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026 tax year) of

76 material that is underscored as reflected on Exhibits A - C.

SYNOPSIS: This Ordinance authorizes the Chief Financial Officer to appoint referees, with the advice and consent of County Council, to hear reassessment appeals. The ordinance proposes payment to referees and to amend the pay for members of the Board of Assessment Review for the purpose of hearing and deciding reassessment appeals. If approved, referees will be paid \$35 per hour for residential appeals and \$50 per hour for non-residential appeals, and members of the Board of Assessment Review will be paid \$50 per hour. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply only to appeals filed on or before March 14, 2025 of the July 1, 2024 market value created by the general reassessment.

FISCAL IMPACT: This Ordinance proposes to amend the pay plans and rates of pay for referees and members of the Board of Assessment Review. If approved, referees will be paid \$35 per hour for residential appeals and \$50 per hour for non-residential appeals, and members of the Board of Assessment Review will be paid \$50 per hour. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply only to appeals filed on or before March 14, 2025 of the July 1, 2024 market value created by the general reassessment.

The estimated fiscal impact (Salaries/Wages and relevant Benefits) of this change is estimated to be \$1,297,189. This is anticipated to affect FY2025 and FY2026. Funds are budgeted in the New Castle County Reassessment Appeal Reserve Fund.
